Weather Forecast

Straight from the Weather Channel. Today's weather in Houston will be dominated by very light southeasterly winds and a continuing chance of thundershowers (30%). The surface high-pressure system which now is sitting right on top of Houston should drift to the west and bring us cooler and drier continental air flow.

The probability of precipitation drops to 20% tomorrow and with expected stronger north to northeasterly flow.

The weekend should be dry, mostly sunny and cooler with afternoon temperatures in the upper 80s. Low temperatures should be in the low 60s.

Background ozone levels this morning were quite low with maximum 6 to 7 AM readings of 18 ppbv at Galveston Airport and Texas City and single digits everywhere else.

Yesterday's ozone maxima were in the upper 20s to low 30s ppbv range across the Houston area.

More than 250 of us have worked many long and tireless hours over the past six weeks but, as a consequence, I believe we have collected the largest, most comprehensive and most sophisticated air quality data set in history.

Certainly, we have collected sufficient air quality and meteorological information to begin to address ozone and fine particle air quality management issues for Houston and the east Texas area.

the leadership provided by Jim Thomas, Jim Price, Ken Rozacky, Dan White, among many others, played an integral role in the study's success. Without TNRCC we wouldn't have been here.

In the coming months we will begin to refine our understanding of Houston/east Texas air quality through a series of group-specific workshops. It is our intent to pull these groups together for a comprehensive data analysis workshop in mid-2001 to identify opportunities to integrate and analyze the entire study data set.
